INTER-FAITH WEEK LAUNCHED AT LAMBETH PALACE

It was with a great sense of pride and anticipation that I accepted an invitation from the Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr Rowan Williams, to represent the General Assembly of Unitarian and Free Churches at a special function held at Lambeth Palace on Monday, 16 November 2009. Inter-Faith Week is an Inter-Faith Network initiative which provides faith communities with a range of local, regional and national opportunities to demonstrate their work together and to highlight the major contributions that religious faith makes to society. The Faith and Public Issues Commission of the General Assembly is able to send representatives to attend the meetings of the network, and I was asked in my role as chairperson of the commission to take part in the launch of the special week, which took place in mid-November.

Those who attended the launch, including Dr Indarjit Singh, The Chief Rabbi, Dr Jonathan Sacks, as well as leaders of all other faith communities, signed a statement of commitment to continue building good inter-religious relations and to contribute to the common good from different religious perspectives. The Secretary of State, John Denham, also attended the event, and was warmly welcomed by those present. He had hosted a similar event in the preceding week, in order to affirm the Government's support of the inter-faith initiative. It was not possible for any Unitarians and Free Christians to attend that launch and exhibition, which had been held at the Queen Elizabeth II Conference Centre in Westminster on 12 November 2009.

The last time I had seen Rowan Williams was the occasion of my final tutorial with him whilst I was a student at Oxford University, in June of 1989. It was a pleasure to speak with him and convey the greetings of the General Assembly. To his credit, the Archbishop remembered who I was, and offered warm good wishes to Unitarians and Free Christians. The assembly room of the palace looked as if it were filled with the cast of Radio Four's "Thought for the Day," as so many different religious leaders were present. I was initially apprehensive about attending the event on my own, but was quickly joined by the representative of the Society of Friends (the Quakers), and the Director of the Christian-Muslim Forum, who was very knowledgeable about the General Assembly, and inquired about the recent marriage of the Rev Jean McNeile and the Rev Alex Bradley! It was good to meet so many different religious figures, some famous, some less well-known. The food and beverages on offer represented an equally

wide variety of cultures, traditions and dietary codes, and it was remarkable for an inter-faith event that alcoholic drinks were served alongside fruit juices and bottled water.

On leaving the palace at the end of the event, I was joined by a Muslim gentleman from Bradford, who was eager to tell me of the Unitarians he knew from his own community. Clearly, the day's proceedings achieved many things, but the most substantial accomplishment was the bringing together of so many people who valued religious diversity, and who were eager to become not only better acquainted, but more aware of each other's perspectives. It is hoped that the celebration of Inter-Faith Week will become an annual fixture in the nation's calendar, and this is something that our fellow-congregations will want to mark in both their worship and their public witness, I am certain.

COUNT YOUR BLESSINGS

The worship throughout the six weeks of Lent will be inspired by the joint programme of BBC's Radio 4 and Churches Together in Britain and Ireland for the season. "People on the Edge of His Pain" looks at some of the key characters in the Passion narratives and considers issues of today that resonate with these characters.

IN MEMORIAM

A service of thanksgiving for the life of church member, Barbara Politt, was held at the Bury Unitarian Church on Friday, 27 November. Harry Taylor provided organ accompaniment to the hymns and Jeff

Gould officiated at the service. The gathering was well-attended by the members and friends of the congregation, Barbara's friends from the wider community, and members of the Jackson's Row Synagogue in Manchester's city centre. A moving commemoration was given to Barbara through the participation of close family members throughout the entire ceremony. Grand-daughters Charlotte and Sophie read suitable poetry, son-in-law Tim played the piano, son-in-law George offered words of tribute, and grandson Edward read the words of Reinhold Niebuhr's Serenity Prayer. A very poignant element of the service was a recording of Barbara's late husband Jim, singing the Lord's Prayer. The congregation left the church to a recording of another grandchild singing Fauré's "Pié Jésus." A service of committal then followed at the East Lancashire Crematorium in Radcliffe. Generous table fellowship was shared upstairs at the church, and Barbara's daughters, Carolyn and Melanie, were able to express their gratitude for the visits that were made to Barbara throughout her illness. Her diagnosis earlier in the year of Motor-Neurone Disease had been a devastating blow to all who knew her, but Barbara had remained alert, communicative and grateful until her death at the age of 79. Barbara's vivacious personality and generous spirit will grace the church for as long as memories of her survive.

CHARITY FUNDRAISING TO BEGIN

A special service will be held on Sunday, 7 February, during which a representative of the charity will provide information on its origins, day-to-day work, and the benefits that it offers to the wider community. It exists to provide appropriate practical and emotional support to people who are recovering from a stroke, especially for those whose speech has been affected. The first event in the year's efforts to raise funds will take place on Saturday evening, 27 February, from 7.30 p.m. in the upstairs room of the church. This will take the form of a Quiz Night, with a fish and chips supper served in the interval. Last year's event, held on similar lines, was a great success, and it was decided to repeat the formula which had enabled the church to welcome members of the public to the evening's festivities.

POINTS OF INTEREST FOLLOWING THE COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON 14 DECEMBER, 2009

We have accepted a new, long-term Yoga booking for Wednesday evenings.

We have recently passed a Fire Department inspection, losing only 10 penalty points because of lack of training and inadequate sound volume of the fire alarms. (Under 15 penalty points is considered very good). We are following up on advice given by the Fire Officers.

The cost of printing the calendar each month, plus the supply of calendar covers, works out at approximately 25p. per copy, equivalent to about £3 per year. Any donations towards the running costs are always gratefully received and should be handed to Jean Jackson.

TRAIDCRAFT NEWS FROM ANNE MILLS

During 2009, Traidcraft sales totalled over £2,700---higher than for the last three years, and a magnificent effort. Many thanks to everyone who has supported the stall throughout the year; whatever we raise makes a tremendous difference to people in countries in the developing world.

Suppliers' prices have risen in the past year, and this looks set to continue over the next few months; however, I shall continue to try out different suppliers, in an effort to contain price-increases as far as possible. For example, the 500 gram tubs of coffee used in the kitchen would cost over £17.00 from Traidcraft; at present, from the Ethical Superstore, the same tubs cost £14.00.

People may have noticed two changes for 2010. The wooden trolley, which has faithfully carried stock between stall and stockroom, has collapsed, beyond repair. As an experiment, I am storing stock in large, durable plastic baskets and hope that this will prove a viable alternative. An inspired Christmas present of a cashbox means that the pudding basin previously used has now retired!

TRAIDCRAFT COFFEE MORNING

Fairtrade Fortnight takes place, this year, between February 22nd and March 7th. In 2010, Fairtrade organisations are being asked to promote two ideas: The Big Swap, and the Big Brew. The aim of the Big Swap is to encourage everyone to exchange items regularly purchased for fairly-traded ones---for example, by buying fairly-traded bananas instead of non fairly-traded ones.

Groups are invited to hold Big Brew events, and I plan to organise a Coffee Morning, on Wednesday, March 3rd, between 10a.m. and noon. Fairly-traded refreshments will be available, the Traidcraft stall will be open, and a raffle will be organised; proceeds will be for church-funds.

Tickets, priced at £2.50 each, will be available from mid-February; please watch out for further details, nearer the time, on the church notice-board and in pulpit-announcements.
