He was a dear friend to Bury Unitarian Church, and will be greatly missed by everyone who knew him.

To his family we offer our deepest sympathies and sincerest condolences.

The Celebration of Fred's Life will be on Tuesday, 2<sup>nd</sup> July at 2.00pm at Bury Unitarian Church. The family have requested 'family flowers only', and that those attending do not wear black. Donations in his memory will go to Bury Hospice. The service will be followed by a private committal, Everyone is welcome to attend the service and to join the family afterwards at Sedgeley Park Rugby Club, Park Lane, Whitefield. #### **GORDON WALKER**

Gordon died peacefully, on Friday, June 21st. He and his wife, Veronica, were strong in their support of our church: they conducted services for us, as often as their commitments allowed; they gave us several talks---Gordon on his Second World War experiences as a bomb-disposal expert, and Veronica on various aspects of Charles Dickens' life; they performed their version of "A Christmas Carol" for us; and they supported as many of our social and fund-raising events as they could. Gordon was a true gentleman: kind, generous, pleasant and courteous; whatever money he raised was donated directly to charity, and many charities have benefitted from his contributions, over the years. Even though Gordon's health was not good, in recent years, he remained positive in attitude, determined in his efforts to regain his fitness, and strong in his attempts to overcome difficulties. To Veronica, we send our most sincere sympathies and good wishes; Gordon will be missed by us all.

**LIBERTY** At this year's Congregational AGM, the decision was taken to discontinue our financial support for Liberty, on the grounds that the organisation had become overtly political. It was suggested that we should, as an alternative, support an environmentally-friendly charity, and Church Council has agreed to select a suitable one. If you have suggestions as to which charity we should choose, please speak to Anne or Betty; a decision will be made at the December Council Meeting.

HARRY TAYLOR Harry died peacefully, at Fairfield Hospital, on May 27th; he was 79 years old. Harry was our Organist and Choirmaster for 23 years; he attended a funeral at the church, the current organist was unwell, and Harry offered to deputise for him, on that occasion---the rest is history! Harry served our church faithfully, in several capacities: he acted as the Men's Fellowship Secretary, and catered for their suppers abundantly; he was the Secretary of the Communications and Worship Committee, for many years, and, briefly, became Church Secretary; he organised the Luncheon Club and took his turn with the catering; he was always very actively involved in church-life. When he retired from his position as organist, for which he would never accept payment, he was presented with gifts and a card, in appreciation of all he had done for the church.

However, his health began to suffer, and his attendance at church started to fall away. He found us again, some months ago, and once more entered into as many church-activities as his health then permitted.

So far, no details about his funeral are available, but members will be informed, as soon as arrangements are in place.

Several of our church-members are suffering from ill-health, at present; we wish them well and will remember them in our thoughts and prayers.

RETIREMENT OF REV. JIM CORRIGALL Jim's retirement service took place at Padiham Unitarian Chapel, on May 26th; our church was represented by Anne, Roger, and Val, and Anne officially thanked Jim for all he had done, on behalf of the General Assembly. Jim has worked long and tirelessly in his post as Minister at Padiham, Rawtenstall, and Chorley, and as the Lancashire Collaborative Minister; his cheery presence has made him popular both in his churches, and in the northeast Lancashire area, and he will be greatly missed by all who knew him.

**NEWS FROM WHITBY.....**We recently received a message from Claire Fox, the treasurer at Flowergate Unitarian Chapel; last year, they requested funds, and we sent a donation of £100 from the church. Individuals also sent personal donations of £10 each. The chapel is now seeking funding from Heritage Lottery Grants; however, annual personal donations are still welcome; there is a notice on the board, which contains full details.

**AND FROM GOLDERS GREEN**.....Rev. Fergus O'Connor has contacted us with news of a charity which is seeking to help those with late-onset Type 2 Diabetes; research is carried out without using animals for research. Please take time to read the notice on the board headed "Sugar Mouse Diabetes Charity". Celia Cartwright and Anne Mills, as the current GA President and Vice-President respectively, have endorsed the work of this organisation, as have many other Unitarians, including some Bury members.

VICE-PRESIDENTIAL DUTIES Since my installation, on April 18th, I have conveyed greetings from the GA to you, at Bury, twice (once during the GA Feedback Service); at Wakefield, after their burglary; at Plymouth; at Evesham; and at Padiham, where Rev. Jim Corrigall was conducting his last service before his retirement. I attended the launch of Ann Peart's new book, at Luther King House; I wrote the review of this for The Unitarian; I attended the Summer Meeting of the Manchester District Women's League, at Stand. I acted as the Authorised Person for our first same-sex wedding at church---the very first such wedding in Bury! I emailed Fran Pickering, to offer commiserations and thanks, as she ends her time as editor of The Unitarian; I also emailed Natasha Stanley, to enquire about the future of this magazine. I visited Essex Hall, met some of the staff there, and enjoyed a positive discussion with the new Chief Officer, Liz Slade.On June 15th, I attended the AGM of the North West Provincial Assembly, at Monton; this was preceded by a service, at which I presented the greetings of the GA to those present.

On June 16th, I conducted the service at Bank Street Bolton, which was followed by an agape lunch. In the late afternoon, I attended an Interfaith Service and Peace Pole planting, at Rawtenstall, organised by the Lancashire Collaborative Ministry.

On June 21st, I was invited to attend the Annual Dinner of The Hibbert Trust, which was held at Luther King House, in Manchester, where I gave the after-dinner speech.

On July 13th, I shall attend the Formal Welcome of Rev. Shammy Webster, at Stand, Whitefield, to represent the GA.

On July 28th, I have been invited to conduct the service here, at Bury.

For the next few months, I shall be conducting services, mainly near home, but also in Aberdeen, and I have already accepted Presidential engagements: for Evesham's Asparagus Lunch, next May, and for Bank Street Bolton's Women's League's Centenary Celebrations, next September.

My duties will, no doubt, take me away from Bury frequently, but I shall do my best to keep in touch with all of you and let you know what I have been and will be doing! *Anne.* 

**AN OCTOBER WEDDING:** Kate and Adrian are delighted to be able to share some very happy news with you.

We are getting married on the afternoon of October 5<sup>th</sup>, here in Bury Unitarian Church, and – of course – you are all invited to join us for this celebration. The service will be conducted by our good friend Rev. Cody Coyne.

Further details, and formal invitations, will follow, but we wanted to let our church family know as soon as we could reasonably do so.

**HARRY TAYLOR** You will all know that our friend Harry Taylor died on 27<sup>th</sup> May, and I know that there are some concerns about his funeral.

Unfortunately, because Harry did not have any family to make arrangements, there have been delays in arranging his funeral. I am working hard together with the hospital bereavement service and a local funeral director, and I hope to be able to give you funeral details very soon. I do promise you that Harry will have the dignified and loving funeral he deserves, and that we will honour his input to our church community.

**MUST, SHOULD, COULD** In the service on 26<sup>th</sup> May, we looked at the concept of 'must, should, and could' and the congregation were asked to think about which bits of the service were the most important to them, which they could take or leave, and which they would rather not see happen. There was also space for suggestions.

I would like to thank everyone who has taken part in the exercise: it was very constructive and people have clearly given a lot of thought to the question. Unsurprisingly, this being a Unitarian church, there are some things which were on some people's 'must' list and on others' 'please don't' list. But I do promise you all the comments will be taken very seriously, and I have already started implementing one or two of the more regular suggestions.

As I promised at the time, I will be sharing everyone's responses. There are too many to include in the calendar, but paper copies will be available on the vestibule table or I can send you an emailed copy.

If you would like to fill a copy in and haven't done so, or if you have thought of something you would like to add, you haven't lost your chance! I am happy to hear people's thoughts at any time – there will be copies of the forms on the vestibule table for the next few weeks at least.

**CONTEMPLATIVE WORSHIP** The next contemplative worship session will take place in the evening on July 9<sup>th</sup>. Everyone is welcome.

Please let me know if the contemplative is something you would like to take part in but aren't able to because of the timing. I am also very willing to sometimes 'hand over the reins' if you feel you would like to lead a session yourself (with or without me there to help or inhibit you!).

#### MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Dear all,

When I was young and used to get comics every week (first Twinkle, then Mandy, then Mandy and Bunty!), I always remember looking forward to the Summer Specials – there were extra stories, and a couple of quizzes, and quite often a little plastic toy folded into the front cover. They were bigger and thicker and on glossier paper and very very exciting.

So welcome to my letter for the summer special of the Bury Unitarian Church calendar – I promise you it won't be twice as long as normal!

Since the last edition we have experienced great sadness in our little community, with the deaths of both Harry Taylor, late in May, and Fred Mitchell, in June. It is at sad times like this that the value of being part of a community really shines. Both of these men, our friends, were loved and valued in the congregation, and both of them will be greatly missed. We know, though, that the friendships and love which came from their involvement here sustained and nourished them, and that the love we will now be able to show to those who loved them the most will sustain them as well.

I am personally grateful to everyone who worked so very hard to make the afternoon so much fun. Spending time together over food and drink is an essential part of being in community. I am glad we do it so often, and grateful that we do it so well.

Since the last letter I have also had a week off: for once we didn't go away, and it was actually lovely to spend some time at home. We had two days out, both very rainy, and spent the rest of the time relaxing and enjoying some quiet. You will see elsewhere in the calendar that Adrian and I also made some rather significant and exciting plans.

As I write, I am in an Oxford college room: once a year I attend a gathering of ministers who studied at Harris Manchester College Oxford, and it's a great opportunity to be nourished and encouraged by each other, to learn, and to continue professional development. Every "professional" has a duty to continue to learn and develop throughout their life, and ministry is no exception. No minister is ever 'done learning', and gatherings such as this are a vital opportunity to spend time with colleagues at every stage of their "career", from second year ministry students to those who have been retired for several years.

It is, however, raining very hard indeed! This year has shown us some very odd weather, but it is good to be constantly stimulated: and changeable weather is one of the glories of life in the UK.

Whatever you are doing over the summer, I hope it is fruitful, relaxing, and nourishing.
