## MINISTERIAL APPOINTMENTS GROUP

The group met on February 18th. Anne had contacted the Principals of Unitarian College, Manchester, and Harris Manchester, Oxford, about our ministerial vacancy and had received assurances from both of them that our details would be passed to their students; both wished us well and felt that, as a church, we had a great deal to offer. A residential weekend will be held, at the end of May, at Luther King House, for anyone who may be considering entry to the ministry; details will be posted on the board. A session on Pastoral Care will be included in the course that Beryl and John are proposing to run during April; at the end of Beryl's ministry, a visiting-group of approximately 4 people will be formed, and Beryl and John have offered to perform rites of passage, whenever necessary.

The advertisement for The Inquirer is almost ready and will be sent in shortly; this advert will also appear on our website, which, on account of the information it contains, shows our strengths extremely well. Pulpit-supply has been set up, from June, this year, and many Sundays have already been filled; information about the organist on duty, each Sunday, will be sent to service-leaders, so that necessary arrangements can be made.

It is disappointing not have had any interest shown in our vacancy; however, various plans are in place, from June onwards, and we have the resources to cope with a period of change. ## **Window on the World .....**

Our church website ([www.bury-unitarian-church.org.uk](http://www.bury-unitarian-church.org.uk)) consists of about 20 pages of information about our own spiritual and social life, as well as that of the wider Unitarian movement. It contains a great number of links to other sources of information and stores an archive of historical information, including 5 years of back-copies of our calendar. It also provides links to a growing library of photographs from our many events and activities.

It was viewed by 487 people, between the 8th of January and the 18th of February, this year. Although, as usual, most of our readers are based in the UK, 19 were from the USA, 8 from Australia, and 7 from mainland Europe; we even had one reader in China and another in Russia!! Most people just read the front page, but 66 of our readers looked at the History pages, and the Book Club page is now growing in popularity, with 39 visitors. The new video-clip, showing the refreshments after the Candlelit Carol Service, was viewed 46 times; I think this is a feature worth developing.

Although, in the nature of "browsing", most visits to our website were quite short, 75 visitors, last month, spent more than 20 minutes, and 55 more than an hour, reading various pages!

It is interesting to look at the popular "downloads" from the site. Last month alone, the Congregational photographs from various years were copied 21 times. During the last year, over 300 copies of the various photos were made! Our regular pictures taken at church events are now uploaded to a Google-server to which we link from our own website. Since we started to do this in 2014, our pictures have received nearly 44,000 viewings!

Our church website sits alongside the calendar as our principal form of communication to church-members, occasional visitors, and the wider community. It is, in many ways, our window on the world. If you have any ideas or contributions which you feel could further improve our visibility, please let me know. I would be more than happy to include additional material. As we are currently using only about a tenth of our available capacity, we certainly need not be constrained by lack of space!!
