Letter from the Minister

Dear all,

Most of you know, I think, that I come from Norwich, which is famous for its medieval churches. The church I belonged to before I moved to Bury was considered a bit of a youthful upstart, only having been built in 1756.

So I was intrigued about moving to work and worship in a building which was younger than me. I didn't really have a picture of what the building was like, and I was intrigued the first time I visited. Like a lot of people, I'd seen pictures of the outside of the building, overshadowed by the Exchange building, and I know I've already confessed to a lot of you that before I first walked in, one summer Saturday in 2016, I wasn't honestly expecting much.

Well, how wrong I was! Our building is an absolute beauty, and I realised that the moment I set foot inside. The sense of light and airiness is wonderful, and it always feels like a deep sacred pleasure to walk into the worship area. We really do owe the congregation of fifty years ago a huge debt of gratitude for their courage and generosity in allowing the previous building to be brought down, and enabling the current one to rise in its place. It must have been heartbreaking to decide to vacate the old building, even though from what I'm told it was an entirely necessary decision, but without their bravery we'd have still been struggling in a building which was no longer suitable for our purposes, or, indeed, safe.

Of course, the church building isn't the church: that's us. The church is the people, the congregation, and all of those people who aren't necessarily members of the congregation, who might not come to services, but who are still part of the community. But if we didn't have a home, if we didn't have this building, we'd lose our sacred space.

None of us will forget that we have had a period in recent years when we couldn't access our building, and if anything made it clear to us just how precious this building is, it was that time, during the lockdowns, when we couldn't gather here. I came in periodically, initially to light candles on Sunday mornings to remember and name everyone who would normally

have been here with me, and the feeling of sadness and loneliness was almost tangible. I know that sounds fanciful, but I genuinely feel that our building missed us, and I know for a fact that we missed it.

And I well remember the joy of returning to worship in the building. We definitely 'came home' the day of that first post-lockdown service. We were sheltered and protected by this glorious building once again.

And, this month we are celebrating the building's fiftieth birthday. We'll join together for a tea party on Saturday 9th March, which is the exact anniversary of the Dedication Service for what was then a brand new church, and then on the Sunday morning we'll join together in worship, marking and celebrating our beloved home. We've been very fortunate to have found a copy of the Order of Service for that Dedication Service, and we'll be using some of the elements in the Anniversary Service. I wonder if some of you will recognise those aspects on the Sunday morning!

Big birthdays (birthdays with a zero at the end!) always feel very significant, and they can be a great time to ponder on what's changed, what's remained the same, what maybe still needs to change, and what we want to manifest over the next few years. I hope that during this anniversary year, and particularly over the anniversary weekend, we can all spend some time being grateful for what we have here in this glorious space, thinking about the changes, big and small, which have happened over the building's lifetime, and thinking with great gratitude about the life and work which has happened here over the last five decades.

As I write, daffodils are appearing at Holebottom, the church garden is getting slowly covered in crocuses, and (despite the fact that it's pouring with rain right now) there is a definite feeling of spring all over the place.

Happy birthday to our building, and blessings on all of us!

Minister's schedule, March 2024

Notes from the building.

In a recent service, we were re-introduced to the light of our chalice by our minister, and it was a service that resonated very deeply with me, because the building, our building, is much like the chalice Kate spoke of: it is designed for light — beautiful, resounding light. The light of the world dances off our walls and streams through our ceilings, it's the perfect Unitarian worship space, because that's exactly what it is supposed to be. It is our sacred home, that is why it is here, that is its purpose and it is wonderful how perfectly it suits that purpose.

If you are in the Sanctuary and see the light pouring in through the side windows, turn your head and enjoy that same light streaming down the opposite wall. The light from the lead glass windows behind the altar, during spring and early summer brings with it astonishing pools of colour rippling along the Sanctuary floor. If you are in the upstairs hall on an evening, look up and enjoy the view from the massive skylight windows and count the stars, or simply marvel at how much light is brought to us by those windows during summer, when we rarely have to turn on the electric lights at all.

It doesn't need to be so beautiful, it's a building, it needs to be practical at best; but it is both of those things, and more, much more... it's absolutely Unitarian and It's properly Sacred. We are blessed by it and by all those who did their absolute best to make that so very, very, real for us all.

April 1894 National Unitarian Conference in Manchester

Attention is specially called to the forth coming meetings in Manchester of the National Conference of our churches. Former Conferences have met in Liverpool, Birmingham, Leeds, and London.

We have been handsomely received elsewhere as guests. It now falls to our own people to play the part of hosts. Ministers and delegates from all over the country will be with us. The Conference will take place 10th April to 13th April 1894. Some 600 people are expected to attend so it falls upon the appointed committee to make arrangements for their reception. This will of course involve both trouble and expense. But "equal burdens break no backs". We trust our people will cordially assist the Conference Committee in the work they have undertaken.

In 2017 the General Assembly National Conference took place in Birmingham.

There were 300 attendees.

Our services and other events are fidget-friendly!

We have also recently taken possession of a new lightweight, easily collapsible, sturdy wheelchair. The wheelchair lives in the cupboard under the front stairs, and you are free to use it at any time it would be useful in church.

If you have a short-term need at home and would like to borrow it, please speak to one of the church officers.






