WHAT IS A MOTHER CHURCH?

It is a sanctuary where we feel secure, it is a home, and its people are a family. It is a house of the spirit, a community of faith in God and in each other. WORKING-GROUP REPORT

The group hoped to meet during April, or early in May, in order to assess, with Beryl, the success and progress of her Interim Ministry.

We have now reached the stage at which we ought to place our names on the vacant pulpit list; however, we must ensure that what we advertise is precisely what is wanted and needed. We should decide whether we require a minister who will serve in a full-time or a part-time capacity; whether we should re-enter a joint ministry with Ainsworth; whether we could consider a joint-ministry with another, reasonably local, church.

At the Congregational AGM, and at the Mothering Sunday service, members were asked to indicate their thinking; 44 people were in favour of a joint-ministry, and 3 were against. This response will be taken into account when discussions are held.

We shall also consider the desirability of a Congregational Assessment Process, in due course; Beryl wishes to be actively involved, if we do undertake this, but there is a great deal of preparatory work to be done first.

We shall continue to report back to the congregation; in the meantime, if you have concerns, or if you wish to raise points, please speak to Anne Mills or Janet Thatcher.

MINISTER'S MONTH

One of the things I have enjoyed being part of since I began my Interim Ministry is the Book Club. The meetings are good humoured and there is lots of laughter (especially from the men when we were discussing 'chicklit') and it is interesting how opinions on the same story can differ enormously. Which makes me think we should not be surprised when our opinions on the church, and what happens in it, differ for we have far more invested in that than in any book. Another pleasure of being part of a book group is that you read books you never normally would and this can either change your mind about a particular author or genre or confirm your opinion. But as in all things the opportunity to experience something lets you make an informed decision upon it.

Many people have remarked on the 'spectrum', displayed in the lounge and compiled following the seminars. The numbers changing their initial position has been more than half and I think it gives both an idea of the diversity in understanding but also where the main theological understanding within the congregation is positioned. A number of people have remarked that it would be good for all congregations to undertake this exercise.

There is a line in a prayer which says, 'Everyone must lose their heart to a child' and I think we did on two recent occasions. One of these was when Callum was baptised and smiled his way round the congregation. The other was on Mothering Sunday when the children sang. I may not have lost my heart to the choir but I was full of admiration for their lovely singing of 'The Lord's my Shepherd'. With excellent readers and coffee and simnel cake to finish it was a good day.

Today Monday I am looking out of the study window where the weather is uncertainly sunny-ish and hoping that the sun will shine with greater assurance on the righteous at Harrogate on Thursday.

The thrush is still singing every morning but now also afternoons and evenings as well. *Beryl*

TRAIDCRAFT

The stall will be open on May 1st and May 15th; if you require Traidcraft items, on other occasions, please ask.

Just Trading Scotland has been in touch about problems with Kilombero rice supplied; the rice has been grown and harvested, but transport-problems have arisen, and the rice is not expected until May, at the earliest. Malawi, where the rice is grown, is a landlocked country; routes to ports on the Indian Ocean, through neighbouring countries, can be troublesome, and the port of choice, Beira, has been silting up. The Just Trading Scotland miller has had trouble getting paid in Zimbabwe; another route chosen through Durban has proved very expensive, particularly when a strike of the South African Transport Workers caused extra difficulties and costs.

I should prefer to purchase Kilombero rice, on account of its quality and value for money, but may have to seek an alternative---at least temporarily. I hope the news will be more positive shortly.

NOTES FROM COUNCIL 11.04.11

New members were welcomed, and thanks were recorded to retiring members.

In order to give guidance to our delegates at the GA Annual Meetings, 3 of the more contentious Motions were discussed; it will be interesting to hear how Conference votes.

Fire alarm testing, on March 6th, was mainly successful, although some improvements remain to be implemented.

Lunch will be served after the "Full Church" Service, on May 8th.

Members of the Efforts Committee will assist with the catering, but other offers of help are welcome.

The Finance Committee is still awaiting details of costings for new A-boards, and for decorating some areas of the church.

Communications and Worship is considering a visit to our Belper church. Clarification is to be sought about the UCM Student Fund, as to whether its funds are available to all students. Concern was expressed about the introduction of Sunday parking-charges, in Bury, and its implications on our own car-park.

Sunday-school prizes were presented on March 6th. We need to note details, if unaccompanied children are dropped off at church.

The Charity Group had a successful Quiz Evening, and £771.89 has been raised so far, this year. If you have money in collection-boxes, please hand it in to Colin Smith.

The minister reported that her seminars had been worthwhile, and the Spectrum results very informative. She is introducing more music to services, of different types. The Spirituality Course starts on April 12th. An evening service will be held on May 22nd.

The University of the Third Age may be interested in hiring our premises, for one afternoon per month; discussions are ongoing.

Responsibilities for lettings have been allocated to various people, in the hope that we will not need a specific Lettings Officer.

We have received a request from our church at Dunham Road, Altrincham, to visit us and learn about our church; this will be arranged for an evening in July.

The message on the answerphone is to be changed, to give Beryl's details, so that callers may contact her.

We still need: a Vice-Chairman, one Council member to serve for 2 years, and a Publicity Officer; if you can help, please speak to Anne Mills or Harry Taylor. Stewards for Yoga are always needed; speak to Marc Peters.
