

Easter

Easter is when we hear the story of Jesus rising from the dead after he has been crucified. When we hear that story we think about all the things which come back to life in spring: if you're going out on walks, or if you've got a garden, you've probably noticed that all sorts of flowers have been growing for a few weeks now, and that the trees are turning from bare branches to buds, and if you look closely enough you can see leaves starting to unfold: you can even see trees getting covered in blossom, and every blossom shows where a fruit might grow later in the year.

Easter is all about rebirth and renewal, and there are new things growing all around us.

Even though we can't celebrate Easter together at the time we normally do (which is a different date every year, so it's not like Christmas), I hope you can do something at home: maybe you're getting an Easter egg, or having a special meal.

And when all this is over and we can go back to church again, we're going to have an Easter service, because when that happens, it will be a rebirth and a renewal, whatever time of year it is.

One of the things I love at church is when you all light your own chalice candles at the front of the church, and I know a lot of you like doing that too. So I've sent you each a tealight and a tealight holder to use at home.

You can decorate them with pens or stickers or anything you like, and then when we get back together in church, we can all light our chalices together.

Every Sunday morning, at the time we would have been starting the church service, I light your wooden chalice, at my kitchen table, and then Ade and I hold a service, and a lot of the adults join in from their own homes. And when we're doing that, I say everybody's name, slowly and aloud, including yours, and I hold you in my prayers for a moment.

If you want to you could light your chalices at 11.15 on a Sunday as well, and take a few minutes to remember each other, and think how nice it will be when you see each other.

Maybe, if you feel comfortable doing it, you could say each other's names, and bring a picture of each other into your minds, and send out a prayer or a wish that everyone is well, and safe, and happy, and that we will soon all be together again, safe and well.

If you've liked receiving your own version of the Calendar, I'll try and do another one, in a few weeks. We don't know yet how long we'll all be staying indoors doing our bit to help keep the virus from spreading further, but whether we're still at home or back at church, it would be nice to have this as a way to keep in touch.

Perhaps your parents would let you write something yourselves that could go in the next one: maybe a message to your Junior Church friends, or a story about something you've done or learned while you've been at home. We wouldn't send the Calendar to anyone who isn't in Junior Church (we might keep a copy at church as well, for the church grown ups to see), and we'd only use your first names.
