DEPARTURES

As I am writing this, my final monthly letter to the congregation, I do so having just received the news of my father's death. He had been living in a nursing home in Massachusetts, USA since 1998, suffering from Alzheimers. Owing to extenuating circumstances within my family, there will not be a funeral service in the coming week, but instead, there will be a memorial service early in November, at which his cremated remains will be present, held in a special container that he chose many years ago for this purpose. It will be my honour to officiate at the service and then commit his ashes to the family grave.

My father's death challenges me to reflect on many things—my own mortality, the meaning of the many relationships I have in my life, and the purpose of existence. His life was seriously marred by a severe mental illness, and by an overwhelming sense of his own inadequacy. There are good memories of his personality and accomplishments as well, and they are what I must focus on in my own words of tribute to him. His death serves as a potent caution to me not to allow negative experiences to diminish the positive events, people and aspirations that have entered my own life.

It is with very mixed feelings that I leave the service of the Bury congregation, as I have come to love the people of the place, and have genuinely enjoyed being part of the wider community here. Equally, I am looking forward to serving another congregation, where I am assured my ministry will be valued, and which I am confident shares my vision of faith and service. As I end my ministry with the people of the Bury Unitarian Church and prepare to move to Padiham, I want to thank everyone who has shared their kindest and most private selves with me over the past three-and-a-half years for their generosity of spirit. For my shortcomings and failures, I ask your forgiveness. I will remember fondly my introduction to life in Lancashire, and hope to serve you in appropriate ways for many years to come.

IN MEMORIAM

The congregation of Bury Unitarian Church was saddened by the loss of two long-stand members in the month of August.

Mildred Watkins died on Thursday, 12 August at the age of 91. She had been living in the Millfield Nursing Home in Heywood for the past two years. A service of thanksgiving for her life took place at the church on Thursday, 19 August, and was followed by a committal at the Rochdale

Crematorium. The minister officiated at both services. Mildred had been born in Bury, and was originally a member of the Chesham Unitarian congregation. Her life was an example of devoted service to her family and to her community. She was married to John ("Jack") for 52 years, and was the proud mother of her son, Andrew. Mildred was grateful that when Andrew married Diane, she became a grandmother to Paula, and eventually became a great-grandmother to Madalyn and Morgan. Her career had been as a felter at the Kenyon Mill on Derby Street. Mildred was a valued member of the congregation, and she gave of her talents freely.

Irene Rogers died on Saturday, 14 August at her home on Harcles Drive in Holcombe Brook. A service of remembrance was held in her honour at the church on Tuesday, 31 August, and was followed by a committal at the East Lancashire Crematorium in Radcliffe that same day. The minister officiated at both services. Irene had originally been a member of the Bank Street congregation, and served both it and the newly-formed congregation since 1974 in a great variety of roles and offices. She was a Trustee at the time of her death. She trained at Progress College, and was employed as the Personal Secretary to the Managing Director of Walmsley's. In 1965 she married Alex ("Alec") Rogers, who pre-deceased her in 1973. Her many friends will remember Irene for her smart appearance, loyalty, and great skill in arts and crafts.

The Congregational General Meeting

The General Meeting of the congregation held on 14th September, provided an opportunity for members to express some sharply contrasting reactions to the resignation of Jeff Gould as our minister. There were expressions of sadness and some bewilderment at the manner of his going.

Looking to the future, it was agreed that we would investigate the possibility of an interim minister, investigate various options for a joint ministry

and seek advice from the General Assembly Congregational Assessment Process which offers confidential facilitation.

A temporary sub-group of six was appointed to guide us through the next stages. Plans were announced for how pastoral care would be offered and also the hosting of visiting service leaders. Please see the details on the notice board in the lounge.

It was stressed that at each stage in the process, all members of the congregation will be kept informed and will have the opportunity to discuss all significant options.

General Assembly President's Notes

It is now six months into my presidential year of office and I have been asked by various Bury members what the position entails. Those who read *The Inquirer* will have seen reports on my activities and here is a brief summary.

By the end of my year of office I will have visited all 16 of our Unitarian Districts which cover the whole of the British Isles. To date I have conducted services (or visited for other celebrations) our congregations at Plymouth, Bradford, Altrincham, Kendal, Rochdale, Ainsworth, Evesham, Urmston, Warrington, Portsmouth, Bridgwater, Taunton, Newcastle – (under Lyme and upon Tyne), Chowbent, Cambridge, Knutsford, Edinburgh, Wakefield, York, Norwich, Gt Yarmouth, Birmingham, Warwick, Chorley, Sheffield and several in London. I am pleased that Betty has been able to accompany me on most of these visits.

Prior to Christmas I have engagements at a further eighteen of our chapels and Districts including South Wales where, in a small area of Ceredigion, there are no less than thirteen Unitarian chapels – all Welsh speaking. I have been asked to address them in the village pub in Talgarreg – they will allow me to speak English as a special concession! This area of rural Wales is known as the Black Spot – a name coined by other denominations whose members were unhappy that such a large Unitarian

presence had been established! The following day I am due to lead a service for the South East Wales District at Nottage.

Each visit has a wonderful story connected with it and the cordial reception I receive throughout the country reflects the true nature of our loving, caring Unitarian community, nationwide.

It is a pity that due to all this activity I have to miss many services at Bury. However the honour of being GA president reflects on our own congregation and I take your collective greetings with me wherever I go!

Please support this venture and ensure its success by buying a bag or two of rice for yourselves, your families and your friends. It will be an achievement of which we can be proud, and one which will make a significant difference to the education of youngsters in Malawi.

ULVERSTON VISIT

Three cars, eleven members of the church and Jeff set off for a visit to Ulverston to have a guided tour of the Majushri Kadampa Meditation Centre at Conishead Priory. Our first port of call was the World Peace Café in the centre of Ulverston for an excellent vegetarian lunch. This café had been set up in 2002 as a sort of outpost of the Buddhist Centre.

After lunch we made our way to Conishead Priory which was a mile or two south, along the estuary. The Priory is a gothic building set in lovely grounds and, with the glorious sun shining down on us, made an idyllic setting. Our tour included watching a film that told the story of the house from 12th century priory, through to a country house, and more recently as a miners' convalescent home and a wartime hospital. It showed the terrible state of the building when it was first bought as a Buddhist centre and chronicled the work they have done so far to restore it to its former glory. We were also told about the Buddhist group led by the Venerable Geshe Kelsang Gyatso that established the centre in the priory. After the film we were given a short tour of some of the areas of the Priory in which restoration work had been done and then visited the wonderful modern Buddhist temple in the grounds. This was a beautiful building and felt very bright and serene. Finally we had tea and cakes in the café.

The weather remained beautiful the whole time we were there; clearly all the gods were smiling on us to make our visit such a great experience. Before setting off for Bury we explored the extensive grounds and walked out to the estuary.

It was a great day out and a very interesting trip. Our thanks go to Val and Jeff for organising the visit.
