#### **FIRE SAFETY INITIATIVES**

Our Fire Safety Group consists of Roger Mills (Trustee Property Steward), Peter Whewell (Church Council Property Steward), and Howard Maden (Church Fire Risk Assessment Officer); the group meets regularly, as necessary, on some Saturday mornings, and has recently been reviewing the church fire-safety procedures; this has included reading and discussing the official documentation provided by the architects (RGP), once the lift was installed. On September 4th, a Bury Fire Service Safety Officer attended, to meet the group; he was present when the fire-alarms were tested whilst two of our regular hirers were using the premises. He will also be present on September 18th, in order to inspect our building and review our procedures; it is ten years since this was last done. A copy of the minutes of the September 4th meeting is on the notice-board; please make every effort to

read it, as it is important that we should all familiarise ourselves with all aspects of fire safety. A training-session will shortly be arranged for those who wish to learn how to use our fire-extinguishers. The group will report regularly to Church Council and the trustees, and meeting-minutes will be available for all members. Please give our Fire Safety Group your full support.

#### **VICE-PRESIDENTIAL DUTIES**

August and September have been busy for me, not only in the execution of my duties, but in preparation for future events. Roger and I attended the service at Bank Street Bolton, on August 4th; lead had been stolen from part of their church-roof, and two rooms were badly-damaged by leaks; we went to sympathise and were made very welcome. On August 6th, I represented the church at the funeral of Daniel, our cleaner Aggie's son---a poignant occasion; the family has greatly appreciated the support given by our church. The following Sunday found me conducting the service at Rochdale, which went well, despite the pianist missing two lines of music out of the first verse of one of the hymns! I acted as the Authorised Person at the wedding of Lorraine and Peter Hunter, on August 25th, on a beautiful late summer day, and a wonderful occasion it was. A NELUM Forum was held at Walmslev Chapel, on August 31st, and I was present; there is a clear mood for change, but this will need to be translated into action in order to succeed. September 1st involved conducting two services---at Ainsworth in the morning, and Rawtenstall in the afternoon; both were well-received, and it was a pleasure to spend time with both congregations. On the following Friday, I attended a Film Evening, at Rawtenstall, and thought it most enjoyable. September 15th brings services to conduct at Hale, and at Dean Row, in the morning; later in the afternoon, I shall attend an Interfaith Service at Rawtenstall; these are held once every two months and are becoming increasingly popular. I will be paying an official visit to Bury, on September 20th, on the first of our Heritage Open Days, and am looking forward to all the material to be displayed then. The month ends on September 29th, when I have been invited to conduct the Anniversary Service at our church in Aberdeen; this visit will be

# **MINISTER'S MESSAGE**

Dear all,

Last month I wrote about the Nightingale Centre in Great Hucklow, and also about Heritage Open Days: and this weekend has had a lot to do with both those things. We were open again so that more people could come to visit our beautiful building, and although we didn't have huge numbers of visitors, those who did come were delighted with the place. I'm particularly pleased that the original architect of the

building, Terry Ratcliffe, was able to vist and that he remarked on how pleased he is at how well we've looked after the building.

Sometimes, when you've "lived in" a building for a while, you stop noticing things so much, but I get a little thrill of pleasure when I walk into our church, particularly into the Worship Area: it has that sacred feel (and church smell) that I think all churches should have. I also remember, the first time I set foot in the building, just over three years ago, noticing that the building did, indeed, feel very loved. I hope our visitors got some sense of that.

The Sunday service during Heritage Weekend focussed on the Send a Child to Hucklow appeal, which raises money to provide holidays for underprivileged children. Thousands of children have benefitted, and we have helped: at the service we witnessed Anne Evitts and George Scaife hand over a cheque for more than £800 to the fund - money they had raised by taking part in a glider flight. Their efforts (and our sponsorship money) will have a very real impact on the lives of children.

Within six weeks, this autumn, there will have been two weddings at church, both of members of the congregation. In August Lorraine Maden married Pete Hunter, in a beautifully Harry Potter themed wedding. Lorraine has been coming to church regularly since she was a young baby, and she and Pete now come with their daughter Hope, so it was a particular delight for the church to host their wedding.

And shortly after this edition of the calendar is published, I will be marrying my partner Adrian, in the presence of our friends and family, thirteen ministry colleagues (it's purely coincidence that that's the number in a coven!), and most of the church congregation.
