Letter from the Minister

Dear all,

By the time most of you read this, Ade and I will be on our way down to Somerset (via an overnight in Dorset with his parents) for a short but much looked-forward-to holiday. As many of you will know, we haven't had an easy summer, with Ade's health crisis and other family things going on, and we don't know what's coming next, so we're really hoping that we're able to make the most of this break.

Three years ago we decided to "scratch an itch" and book a chalet at Butlins, which might seem a bit out of character to those of you who know us. But when I was a child I always wanted to go to a holiday camp, so we decided to act on that childhood dream. We pretty much expected to hate it, and had all sorts of contingency plans in place, but when we got there we loved it, and this will be our third trip, staying in the same chalet.

We're not very sociable, so we don't take advantage of all the entertainment there is on offer, and we actually both find that the break feels like a retreat, even though that's a word normally used for deliberately spiritual or religious breaks. In a very real way it gives us the chance to 'retreat' from our normal lives, and spend time in a different space, with different light, and few of the distractions that 'real life' brings.

I think that kind of intentional break is really important for us all spiritually and emotionally, whether it's a silent week in a remote place, a few days quietly hidden away in a holiday camp, or just a few minutes alone to breathe gently before we start our day.

I don't want you to think we spend the whole time quietly contemplating life: we've already got two outings planned and we've been looking forward all year to having dinner in a really spectacular pizza place we found the first year. It is a holiday as well as a retreat, and your minister will have a magnificent tantrum if we come home without having spent a little while in the amusement arcades.

One thing we always do at Butlins, at least once, is visit the tiny chapel on site. It's a very basic building, and we were very surprised to find it there. But it's beautiful, with a real sense of the sacred about it, and reading the simple but heartfelt messages people leave in the visitors' book tends to make me cry: something about that sanctuary in the middle of a secular space devoted purely to enjoyment obviously moves people to share deep feelings of joy, sorrow, gratitude and sadness. I think spaces in which people have prayed and had spiritual moments pick up on that air of sanctity, and the Butlins chapel certainly has that feeling about it.

Before we head off, we'll have had a busy Harvest Sunday at church: we'll be starting the morning with an informal "fifth Sunday breakfast", then celebrating our Harvest Festival, and then we'll be sharing our Harvest Lunch after the service. I love days like that at church: I know that the service is very important, but so are all the things which go on around and alongside it. Some Sundays the 'buzz' in the lounge is an absolute delight, and although I pretend (badly) to be all stern when I'm suggesting people might like to leave the lounge and join us for the service itself (it does happen occasionally!) I'm actually really delighted that people get so involved in conversation and friendship that they forget the time.

We're really lucky to have the lounge as a space to socialise: I know a lot of people like to move into the worship area early, and having a place set aside aside for chatting means that the sanctuary can be kept as a place for quiet reflection before and during the service. I love the different textures we have in our building and in our community.

By the time I'm back from my annual leave, we'll be well into autumn, and the clocks will be nearly ready to change.

I hope that you have a good October, and I will see you all soon.

There won't be a mid-week meditation this month, as Kate will be on leave. They will resume in November, and we'll work out a date nearer the time.



List them and you may even feel bad about how many you still have to do, or for somehow failing to have achieved so many of them. We have so many ways of making ourselves feel bad for not getting around to all of the tiny little jobs. We shouldn't, but when we do, we should stop, take a few breaths and remember that the significance of those tiny little jobs is nothing in comparison to what we just achieved.

From the Calendar November 1889

Boys' Reading Room and Social Union

Open to teachers and the adult and first classes. Supplied with newspapers, periodicals, chess, draughts, and dominoes. Week evenings, 7-9.45. Subscription 10d per quarter. Annual meeting on Wednesday, November 6th, at 9pm.

From then on there are reports each month on Chess and Draught matches. They played against Ainsworth units, Rochdale Unitarians, Bolton Unitarians, and Brunswick.



From the Calendar November 1890

The young men decided to go ahead with an application for 2 rooms. Their number of members at this time was over 60. Unfortunately, the request was refused. However, a chess and draught league were started.

The Girls' Social Club From the Calendar November 1889

Is this institution really wanted by those for whom it is intended? The room has been open on Wednesday and Saturday evenings, and newspapers and magazines have been supplied to it; but the attendance has been poor, that the question has been forced upon us—Do the elder girls want the club kept up, or do they not? Given a few weeks and they must decide.

The subscription is 6d a quarter and the secretaries are Mrs Walmsley and Miss Dearden.

From the Calendar October 1890

In a former Calendar the question was asked pointedly about the desirability of a social club for the girls. The interest was confined to a few, it was on the right lines, so another attempt will be made to establish it.

What do they want? A room they can have as their own and can make comfortable and have to themselves any evening of the week except Sundays. The intention being to make the Bank Street Girls' Social Club useful, pleasant and popular. The committee obtained the sanction of the teachers to their idea. The club would be open every evening from 7 to 9.



A later Calendar reports: The club is getting on famously and has over 50 members. Thus, the Girls' Club continued.

It was still going in 1958, I remember Neville's mother, Anne Kenyon, being a member.

Do you find this easier to read?

Almost everything we provide in print at church (including services, Calendars, letters, reports, and the minutes of most meetings) is available in a large-print format, and a recorded version of the Calendar is available on CD and on memory disk.

Accessibility

We have also recently taken possession of a new lightweight, easily collapsible, sturdy wheelchair. The wheelchair lives in the cupboard under the front stairs, and you are free to use it at any time it would be useful in church.

If you have a short-term need at home and would like to borrow it, please speak to one of the church officers.

We know that there will be needs we haven't accounted for: if there is anything which would make it easier for you to engage with what we do, please do tell us!
